### Message from Mr.B

A very short half term but as you will read we have a lot to celebrate and be proud of! Our Year 6 children have been amazing in the approach to their SATs test – I could not be more proud of the effort and hard work the showed during the week. They showed a superb Growth Mindset—well done! Our school football team remains unbeaten and we are through to a semi final in one competition and won our league. We have done a lot of work with our STEM partners (Science, Technology, Engineering Maths) and our Year 6 children took part in a National Challenge and won! In a separate challenge year 6 entered a sustainability Eco invention challenge which Abigail and Dayana won and we will receive £1200 to purchase much needed STEM resources. We have also showcased our writing curriculum and hosted a visit from the Literacy coordinator for Manchester High School for Girls who was amazed at the quality and quantity of our work. We have audited our Foundation curriculum and we are happy with the progression of these subjects throughout school; next half term we will focus on our History curriculum.

Over the holiday our caretaker will be taking a weeks well deserved rest but on his return he will be painting the front gates, weather permitting and repainting the impact rooms. Those classrooms with carpets will have them deep cleaned and all the toilets will be stripped and varnished. Due to the amazing success of one of our bee hives we have had to have an early harvest as the frames were getting too heavy to lift! We have collected 36 jars of honey!! We will store this until the main harvest at the end of September when we will arrange for you to purchase it. A fantastic effort by the bee keepers (staff and pupils).

There have been some staffing changes; Mrs Southern worked in Year 1 covering maternity leave and was an excellent addition to our team while she was here and we wish her all the success in the future. Mrs Guggiari has returned from maternity leave and is back with Year 1. Mrs Pietrzak has returned from Jury service and I am grateful to the team that supported Reception in her absence. I am delighted to share with you that Mrs Roberts in Year 2 got married over the Easter holidays and will adopt her new married name Mead in September. We are currently in the process of working out our staffing structure for next year and I will share this with you early in the next half term.

# Year 6 Imperial War Museum Visit (written by Arthur & Rebecca)

Year 6 visited the Imperial War Museum in Manchester, which coincided with their History topic on 20<sup>th</sup> Century Conflict. In our history lesson we've looked at the First and Second World Wars and the reasons and repercussions from both conflicts.

We arrived at the museum and were given free time to explore - looking at lots of interesting exhibits including old war vehicles like tanks and a fire truck. We were told about people who became famous for their actions in WW2. We also saw and learned about old weapons and battles used in different conflicts and how they evolved and improved. There was even a barge balloon hanging from the ceiling and old wartime uniforms. There were many repurposed artefacts used as memorials, which had been created during the WW2 from things like downed aircraft.

We also enjoyed an Easter competition which was put on by the museum and we watched powerful videos about animals in war and a poem written and performed by Tony Walsh 'Mightier than War'.

We enjoyed playing a war like game which simulated what it was like in a tank. It was very interesting and getting to study primary sources was really interesting.

# A 'Bog Baby Hunt' in Year 2



Year 2 started the half term with a very exciting mystery note that they discovered in the classroom! It led them on a hunt, following a glitter trail around the school grounds until they found a book hidden by the Bog Baby! They have then used that book and the 'Bog Baby hunt' as inspiration to write a recount and design their own version of Bog Baby in literacy, creating a setting and character description.

# Year 3 visit The Mandir Temple

Year 3 visited a Hindu Mandir to explore the key beliefs and practices of the faith. We had a guided tour around the Temple, where we were encouraged to ask questions as we went. The BAPS Swaminarayan Sanstha we visited works to preserve Indian culture and promote the Hindu values of faith, unity, and selfless service in communities worldwide. From the moment the bus arrived in the car park, the impressive building captivated Year 3.

The children were particularly intrigued when they entered the Temple's prayer area and even more so after hearing our host share stories, especially about Lord Swaminarayan. As part of their RE lessons, Year 3 has been learning about different religious places, and they truly enjoyed this hands-on experience!

# A 'Bee'rilliant Start for our Year 5 Beekeppers!

What an amazing start we have had to the new beekeeping season! The majority of the Year 5 children have now had at least one chance to put on a bee suit and take part in a full hive inspection. We have been so pleased with the enthusiasm and positivity that all these children have shown. They have all been willing to get properly involved with the checks and have been confident to hold the frames that have at least 2000 bees in each one of them! They have asked many questions about how the hive works and are showing a real curiosity.

The yellow hive has been a particular success so far this season (it currently contains around 75,000 bees!) that we have done an early extraction which the children have taken part in and the honey will be on sale next half term.

The children will continue to carry out the inspections throughout the whole of next half term and we hope they will share all of their knowledge and experience with you at home.

# 'Surprises' in Year 1

This half term's learning has focused on stories from other cultures; we have enjoyed looking at 'We All Went On Safari' and 'Handa's Surprise' especially. We created story maps and used masks to act them out before researching other African animals using the iPad and reinventing the story to write our own. Our teachers were amazed by our work.

There has been a strong food theme running throughout our learning this half term; we have looked at plants in Science and have been out exploring our lovely school grounds to see what we could find. We also enjoyed investigating where our food comes from in Geography and looking at the production of foods such as bananas and potatoes. And to support our learning on stories from other cultures we took part in a fruit tasting session to experience and help us to describe some of the fruits from the story Handa's Surprise!

# Animals in Nursery

This half term the Nursery children have been learning about Animals and their lifecycles. We started the topic looking at Minibeasts with a particular focus on the lifecycle of a caterpillar. We enjoyed watching time lapse videos of the transformation and then used a variety of materials to sequence the cycle.

When exploring jungle and farm animals we learnt about mothers and their young.

We discussed the different habitats that animals live in, exploring how they survive the wild. We also enjoyed creating jungle print art, discussing the different patterns we could see and taking on the role of a Vet in the role play area.
